



AREAS OF LEARNING

As Mathematicians we will...

- learn about 2D and 3D shapes and their properties
- continue to explore adding and subtracting up to 10
- count in 2s, 5s and 10s



As Readers we will...

- explore the story 'I want my hat back'
- read a range of stories and non-fiction books
- continue to work in our reading groups to improve our fluency and reading with expression



As Writers we will...

- learn about question sentences and punctuating them with question marks
- focus on our letter formation within our writing



As Engineers we will

- learn about how we can join different materials
- design and make a functioning hat that we can wear
- select from a range of materials and test them for strength/stability



As Sportspeople we will ...

- develop underarm and overarm throwing at a target.
- select the correct throw for the target
- develop throwing for accuracy and distance using underarm and overarm.



As Computer Scientists we will ...

- explain what a given command will do
- combine 'forwards' and 'backwards' commands to make a sequence
- combine four direction commands to make sequences
- plan a simple program
- find more than one solution to a problem



As Scientists we will

- learn about everyday materials and identify what different objects are made of e.g. metal, wood, plastic, glass, water and rock
- learn the simple physical properties of a variety of everyday materials
- compare and group different everyday materials



As Musicians we will

- Compose word patterns in groups and melodies in pairs using mi-re-do (E-D-C)
- Chant together rhythmically, marking rests accurately
- Sing an echo song while tapping the beat, and clap the rhythm of the words understanding there is one beat for each syllable
- Play a simple ostinato on untuned percussion
- Recognise the difference between a pattern with notes (pitched) and without (unpitched).



Homework

Each week a phonics sheet related to our learning will be sent home with your child. This does not need to be returned to school, but if it could be completed it will give your child the opportunity to practise their phonics skills and apply it to their writing.

If possible listen to your child read daily, as this will really help to develop their fluency and comprehension skills. If you have any questions, please do contact one of us.
